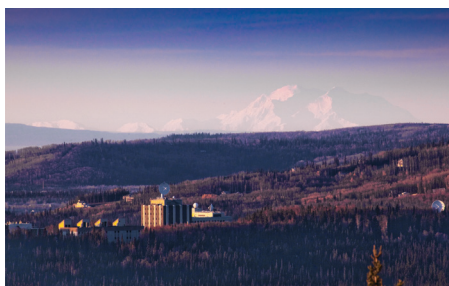


North to Alaska!
